

On my office wall there is a simple 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ " X 11" piece of paper. On it is written:

"Press On! Nothing in the world can take the place of persistence. Talent will not; nothing is more common than unsuccessful men with talent. Genius will not; unrewarded genius is almost a proverb. Education will not; the world is full of educated derelicts. Persistence and determination alone are omnipotent. The slogan Press On! has solved and always will solve the prob*lems of the human race.*" — Calvin Coolidge

Yet in my travels, especially among those in Masonry, there is a desire for something more. A better world or something greater than self. A chance to be rich, a chance for love, a chance to make a difference in someone's life - whatever it is. But it just doesn't happen. There has to be a motivator. Is that motivator like what you would read in Frontline Heroes - a person's desire to have purpose, do worthwhile work and make a difference? Or is the motivator simply the desire? Each of us will be different.

Mario Andretti, a very successful world-class race car driver says "desire is the key to motivation, but, its determination and commitment to an unrelenting pursuit of your goal – a commitment to excellence - that will enable you to attain the success you seek." It worked for him, but can it work for you?

I think both President Coolidge and Mr. Andretti are right. The first thing you must have is motivation. After you have the motivation the world is at your feet. If you have motivation, the mind will find a way for you to succeed. But this is a topic for another column. Yet motivation without persistence and determination will simply "die on the vine." In this issue, I want to delve into Can We Make A **Difference**?

As I have worked, laughed, and played in this community and others, I have attended leadership seminars, presentations, keynotes, clubs, and even found leadership lessons in some of the strangest places. While they are each called leadership, they could all be classified as making a difference. Does it make a difference whether it is called the Passport to Wealth or How To Lead Effectively? Is the audience the same? When you peel away the layers of the onion, each of us is involved in leadership. The plumber utilizes his critical thinking skills to diagnose the cause of the clogged pipe which is producing undesirable consequences for the building owner. The surgeon utilizes his leadership in guiding the team through a procedure to save a person's life or limb. The store clerk utilizes the concepts in providing the best customer experience possible within his store. We are not limited by the title – leader. Yet each of us as leaders need to find inspiration.

Many of you know of my background in the emergency services. People say that we don't really do anything except react to the situations we encounter. This is partially true. We react. Only in our prevention activities do we lead people to change behaviors. When we do react, however, we also provide hope. It is this hope that makes it possible for them to make a difference. To help the patient or patient's family in a time of crisis by providing hope to experience another precious moment. To help the family while their memories are being washed away in a flashflood, giving them hope by salvag-

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- ing whatever items they can from a storm ravaged home. Giving them hope by a kind word or touch when they are at their worst.
- It's not easy to pass your firefighter certification. It takes dedication and persistence. What motivated me was to provide the best care anywhere. It took determination and persistence as evidenced by studying, practicing, continually learning, testing and challenging that allowed me to be recognized by my peers with awards and honors.
- As you reflect upon your own circumstance or profession, peel away another layer. This time let's look at the layer of your Masonic involvement. Are you proud of the membership, heritage, and history it represents? Or are you a closet Mason?
- I recently read a book titled Wooden's Words. It's a book about John Wooden. For basketball fans, he was the greatest coach of the 20th century. For his players, he was a devoted leader, motivator, rolemodel, and inspirer. For his family, he was a devoted husband and father. There are many books dedicated to the wisdom of this coach. Yet it is the biography of the man which motivated me to write this column. There are so many pearls of wisdom that he is known for; yet, he would say all he did was distill what was out there and reword it so that his players would take them to heart.
- So here I present some of them so that we can take them to heart as we determine *Can We Make A Difference*?
- Success is peace of mind which is a direct result of self-satisfaction in knowing you made the effort to become the best you are capable of becoming.
- Failure to act is often the greatest failure of all.
- It is so easy to quit, to turn back, to give in. Never do so. Try again, and again. Try harder, smarter, but try again.
- If you're not making some mistakes, you're not doing anything not trying to make things happen.
- Prepare, plan, practice hard, and then execute without thought of failure.
- Perfection is impossible. Capitalizing on imperfection mistakes makes all the difference.
- Your opinion, if you are respected, will often carry more weight than your advice
- Saying bad things about others is a bad habit. For all the shortcomings you see in others, keep in mind that your own failings are many.
- Listen with your eyes, not just your ears.
- It takes less than one second to say thank you. The rewards last much longer.
- The more concerned we become over things we can't control, the less we will do to improve those things we can control.
- The past is for reference, the future for dreamers; the present mo-• ment is where you create success.
- Seek those moments when you can offer a sincere compliment to those who don't get many compliments.

DOUBLE EAGLE AWARDS

This is a short primer for the Double Eagle Awards program. Simply stated, the Double Eagle Program is a series of sequential awards members earn for attendance at meetings or events and service to the Valley of Pensacola.

The initial award is a double eagle medallion suspended from a black ribbon when the individual has earned 500 points. As the individual earns additional points, he is awarded a colored bar for the medallion, a scroll, or a different colored ribbon to add to the initial Double Eagle medallion. The points are accumulated by the individual over multiple years and receive the appropriate award only during an award ceremony the following year.

Points are accumulated on an annual basis from December 1st through November 30th. The points vary for each activity depending upon several factors including how much time is required, how many resources you dedicate and so on. For instance, did you know that if you attend just one of the stated meetings and place your name on the attendance sheet, you will be awarded 25 points toward the next level in the Double Eagle program? There are many more activities-too many to list here. However, when the books are closed a report is prepared for the General Secretary who will then compile the list and order the awards. The Personal Representative will award or consecrate each Knight of the Double Eagle in an open meeting.

To alleviate confusion on what levels the awards represent, we have listed them below. To receive the:

Initial medallion—500 points	s is needed. The next is the:
Red bar attachment	1000 points
White bar attachment	1500 points
Blue bar attachment	2000 points
Gold Scroll attachment	2500 points
Red neck ribbon	5000 points
White neck ribbon	7500 points
Blue neck ribbon	10,000 points
Gold neck ribbon	15,000 points
Red-white-blue neck ribbon	20,000 point

The Double Eagle award is cherished throughout the Orient of Florida. Members are encouraged to wear their awards at any meeting where the Sovereign Grand Inspector General has authorized the wearing of Scottish Rite regalia. This is an outward expression of the pride the Valley has in your services and should be worn with pride as this award represents a great accomplishment.

short comings. We trust the Supreme Architect to lead us to friendship, morality and brotherly love.

So, how do you wake up each morning? OK...besides the moans and groans; snap, crackle and pop; how do you wake up? Do you wake up each morning with determination and go to bed with satisfaction? We need to take a long hard look at ourselves. That means self-reflection. Are we happy with the person we are? Do we make daily advancement in our lives? Do we enrich the lives of others? 
AUTOMATIC EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATOR

You may notice in the next few months, we have a white box hanging on the wall and wonder what it is. Well, it is an Automatic External Defibrillator or better known as an AED. This was the result of a fundraiser held by the KCCH in 2012 and a large donation by a generous Brother (to get his name, you'll have to find the box on the wall). Once placed into service, it is designed to help an individual who has a heart attack and their heart stops beating.

In July we had 13 people attend a CPR/AED training class to operate the device and provide lifesaving cardiopulmonary resuscitation. Remember, we have placed the welfare of our Brothers and Sisters high on our priority list and felt there could be no greater investment in them than the opportunity to save a life. It is our fervent hope that this device hangs on the wall and is never used. If you would like to attend a CPR/AED class in the future, let us know. We're ready to help. \bigstar

GOOD OF THE ORDER

On Thursday, July 18th, the SGIG in Florida announced that the Supreme Council in Washington, D.C. had selected four individuals from the Valley of Pensacola to either be coroneted as a 33° Inspector General Honorary or going through an investiture as a 32°, Knight Commander of the Court of Honour (KCCH).

The 33° is conferred by the Supreme Council upon 32° KCCH members of the Rite in recognition of exemplary service to the Rite, or to humanity, or in public life, while practicing the principals taught in the Degrees. The Rank and Decoration of Knight Commander of the Court of Honor is conferred by the Supreme Council upon 32° Masons who have rendered commendable service to the Rite. This Rank and Decoration is not a degree and is not a stepping stone to the 33° , although a member must be a KCCH for at least 46 months before being eligible to be nominated to receive the 33° .

Hon. Jimmy Lee Lindt—Inspector General Honorary

Bro. Oscar R. Ferrell—Knight Commander of the Court of Honour Bro. William Jerald Garner—Knight Commander of the Court of Honour

Bro. James Robert Kickliter—Knight Commander of the Court of Honour

In addition to those from the Orient of Florida, the Supreme Council will honor one more member of our Valley. The Grand Monarch of Grottos of North America, Brother **Otto Edgar Thiergart**, will be invested with Knight Commander of the Court of Honour.

The Investiture/Coronation will take place in Tampa on November 9, 2013, at the Tampa Scottish Rite followed by a banquet at the Grand Hyatt Tampa Bay.

MEMBER IN THE SPOTLIGHT

This edition of *Member In The Spotlight* looks at one of our 32° members who is not only active within the Valley, he is a prominent officer in another group in Masonry. This Brother was born on July 3, 1948. If only his mom held on for one more day...we could celebrate with him and our Country on the same day. He is one of six children. Charles, Marti, George, James and Bernard were his playmates and fellow workers on the family farm which was 35 miles west of Davenport, Iowa.

OK, we've held out long enough. This edition's spotlight is on Otto Thiergart. Otto was the third child of Walter and Connie Thiergart. As was the custom for younger siblings, Otto went off to find his fortune. He enlisted in the US Navy right out of high school. After electronics school and over three years of sea duty, Otto was assigned to NAS Pensacola in May of 1972. Within nineteen days he met the love of his life, Lois, and married her ten months later.

After the Navy he worked a year in sales and then went to work for the postal service. In 1978, he and Lois started buying rental houses. At that point he decided to retire, travel and help Lois with the property management.

Lois and Otto have been dance partners, work partners, and have shared membership in Unity Church of Christianity for 38 years. Otto has served on the church board for 13 years and four of those a board president. All the while, they raised four children; Mark, Michael, Matthew and Lisa. Now they are the proud grandparents of six. Yes, six, and that doesn't include their great-grandson yet. While the family was growing, Otto returned to school and finished his Associates Degree from Pensacola Junior College.

Otto joined the Masonic Lodge at West Pensacola #296 in 1975. He went on to the Scottish Rite in April 1976, the Shrine in November of 1976 and the Zelica Shrine of the Grottos of North America in April 1990. Guess he was a little busy between 1976 and 1990.
