This was the most lethal terrorist attack in U.S. history, killing almost 3,000 people; 343 of those people killed were members of the New York City Fire Department (people I had gotten to know well during the fall of 2000). As a leader for those who've served their Country, it is essential that we take a moment to reflect on the lives lost and the heroism displayed during those difficult hours and days. And the many days since when our men and women were deployed overseas, preventing such a tragedy on our soil again.

THE SANDS OF TIME

The drive up into the higher elevations took fifteen minutes and required strong nerves and good brakes. They followed the directions they had been given and eventually caught sight of the crumbling priory, resting on an intersection of paths, its shattered square tower flanked by a merciless precipice. The road ended about half a mile from the ruins and the hike up, along a trail of emaciated rock flowered with thyme, beneath a canopy of great pines, took another ten minutes.

They entered the site.

Signs of neglect lay everywhere. The thick walls were bare and the man allowed his fingers to slip along the gray-green granite schist, each stone surely quarried from the mountains and worked with faithful patience by ancient hands.

A once grand gallery opened to the sky with columns and capitals that centuries of weather and light had tarnished beyond recognition. Moss, orange lichens, and gray wiry grass littered the ground, the stone floor long ago returned to sand. Grasshoppers sang a loud castanet.

The rooms were hard to delineate, as the roof and most of the walls lay collapsed, but several stood out. A large hall and another spacious room that might have been a library or scriptorium. He knew life here would have been frugal, thrifty and austere.

The man sat atop one of the chucks of stone and stared up at the sky. He glanced farther into the decayed temple. Bees hummed in the shadows. Dusty shafts of light poured through slits cut through the rock at varying angles, apparently designed to take advantage of the drifting sun. Something caught his eye. He stepped close to one of the rock walls, hewn smooth now bare of any decoration except a carving about ten feet above him. The crest of a helmet with a swathe of linen dropping on each side of a male face. The features were gone, the nose worn smooth, the eyes blank and lifeless. On top was a sphinx. Below was a stone shield with a splayed cross pate.

While the story above is pure conjecture, should a tragedy befall our society and anarchy erupt, it is not far from reality. During the events of the month of November, we lost three good men. One decorated with the rank and dignity of Inspector General Grand Cross. And two others Inspector General Honorary. That's not to say that these men are the only ones to be singled out. Just that they had achieved significant milestones in our Fraternity. Which brings us back to our story.

The man was at a fallen temple. This could have been any Masonic Lodge, or even our beloved Valley. The only reason this hasn't happened yet, is the hard work of the members, their families and friends. Masonry could very well go the way of the story above and all that would be left would be the markers we used to guide our paths through the lessons we learned.

But it is also much more. There is no mention of those who came before. As a Valley we strive to remember our past, live in the present, and cement a future by working hard today so that we have a future tomorrow. So let's mention those men. The Grand Cross belonged to a longtime supporter of the Valley. His name was Ferris Eugene Booker. Now granted he had those that loved him or didn't. Yet he did so much for this Valley that most will not remember. There was a time when our building was about to cave in on itself. Not many knew that. He procured grant money to save a local heritage site, which has deep meaning to the Valley of Pensacola and the men who had led not just Masonry, but government and business alike. Making Pensacola a long term community which could have been lost to the sands of time with Destin and Mobile jockeying for the attentions of the military and US Government for seats at the table.

When the work was begun on our "home" at 2 East Wright Street, so many things were learned that many of us had no idea about. Sure there were pictures, but did you know besides the "Widow's Walk" the roof joists were burned through in several areas? Or that the building was one of a handful in town that had a basement. When hurricane Ivan came ashore in 2004, it did significant damage to the building. So much so, we could not meet there for several months until things were repaired or secured. Ask Illustrious Harry K. about all the work that went on to let us back into our home. Illustrious Harry was instrumental in making that possible along with Illustrious Jim Holland, our Personal Representative at the time. Illustrious Gene, worked long hours for weeks making sure our home would be there for the next generation.

And then again, when the church next door declared their interest in our building, he worked on expanding the then York Rite Center to accommodate the larger crowds of the Scottish Rite. Those larger crowds were due to the hard work of the properties committees, the work committees, and dining room staff.

Another member who has been lost to the sands of time used to be very active in the Valley in the 1970s, 1980s and early 1990s. He ran a private business and contributed to the successful business operations of the Valley. He worked to maintain our treasury and keep us in the black. Over time, he fell away from the hard work of the Scottish Rite having to work more diligently during business downturns in the 80s and 90s. Charlie Sherrill gave his heart and soul to this Valley at a time when the need was great. Is he less of an outstanding Mason because his focused changed in later years? I for one resoundingly say NO! He gave of his talents for a long time. But now we have lost him too. Do you remember his smile, hearty laugh and the "smack" on the back? If not, you are evidence that the sands of time flow faster than anyone wants.

Lastly, Illustrious Greg Smith. For a long time he served as our Director of Work. An outstanding ritualist and mentor when it came to the degrees of Freemasonry. There was a time when no matter what Masonic body you belonged, you knew Greg. His efforts on behalf of the Valley are legendary, and he was at times bigger than life. But, today, we have lost him too. There are some who can share stories of times when Escambia 15 needed a little extra help, or York Rite and even our Valley. He never shied away from hard work, fellowship and getting his two cents in. I had the pleasure, or displeasure of replacing him when he stepped aside. I say displeasure, but I only say that because they were such big shoes to fill.

Share your story today with the members of the Valley. While these are only three of the men who we have lost, there are so many more. At the end of this article will be listed everyone we have lost in the last year. Don't let the sands of time bury our memories of these Brothers and Sisters. For if we do, we will be like the story that started this article "once grand gallery opened to the sky with columns and capitals that centuries of weather and light had tarnished beyond recognition. Moss, orange lichens, and gray wiry grass littered the ground, the stone floor long ago returned to sand."

It is now in our care, to keep our memories alive, the tales of the victories and the challenges, knowing that you too will one day disappear into the sands of time in our members' memories. How many will remember all the things you did for the Valley or will they only lament, that you were here and then you were gone. Rest easy my Brothers and Sisters. The torch has been passed and a new challenge has been put down.
